#### Dewey Who?

elville Louis Kossuth Dewey invented the Dewey Decimal Classification System (DDC) when he was 21 and working as a student assistant in the library of Amherst College. A pioneer in library education, Dewey also helped establish the American Library Association (ALA) in 1876.

More than 200,000 libraries worldwideincluding the OBC Library-in more than 135 countries use the DDC system.

Here are the ten main classes of the DDC:

000-099 general works

100-199 philosophy and psychology 300-399 social sciences 400-499 language

natural sciences and mathematics 500-599

600-699 technology 700-799 the arts

200-299

800-899 literature and rhetoric

religion

900-999 history, biography, and geography Source: Online Computer Library Center

### Survey SAID

he library survey completed January 28, 2008, received 61 responses, or about 17%

of our active church members. The good news is that the vast majority believe we should maintain a library and affirmed that we are headed in the right direction. Over 80% of respondents believe the library should focus on books and articles by OBC members, interfaith religious books by current scholars and spiritual guidance books. A majority also believe the library should provide religious research and reference books, history, criticism and interpretations. Based on the survey results and considering our limited resources, the library committee has set a policy to not add non-religious novels and movies that would duplicate what is available in public libraries. Slightly over half of the respondents want a newsletter...and here we are with our inaugural issue. If you have comments or suggestions for future articles, please let us know. #### Periodicals

The magazine rack on the back wall behind the desk displays twenty or more magazines and newsletters. The four most popular this year seem to be:

<u>Christian Century</u>: a mainline ecumenical magazine published bi-weekly. Its motto is "Thinking Critically, Living Faithfully."

Its counter-part is the <u>Christianity Today</u> magazine, which has a moderate to right theological bent. It is probably the most widely read protestant magazine in America.

The third magazine is the evangelical center to left journal called <u>Sojourners</u>. Its editor and founder is the Rev. Jim Wallis. Some of its contributors also have written for Newsweek and People magazines.

The fourth most popular is of a very different type. <u>Weavings</u>, published bi-monthly, is called "a journal of the Christian spiritual life." It usually has one theme per issue. Each volume is

beautifully written and illustrated and carries no advertisements.

heck out a couple of books for summer reading. The library contains a wide range of fiction and non-fiction, most of which have a religious or spiritual point of some kind. Our collection of various translations of the Bible and commentaries on the contents of the Bible number in the hundreds of volumes and take up about one-quarter of our shelf space. Those who like history and biography will find a very wide selection. The collection on the person of Jesus and books on the spiritual life are extensive. Come in before or after worship service on Sunday or on Wednesday night and browse. The self-service check-out procedures are posted on the desk.

#### **Bible Search Websites**

Libraries are for learning, researching and pleasure reading. Librarians are for listening, assisting and helping patrons find what they need. Although we don't have a staff librarian at Oakhurst, Al Crisp is usually there on Sunday mornings to help you find what you need as he's doing the much needed maintenance duties of shelving returned books and filing cards for checked-out books.
